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

### FAO 2013-17 Pacific Multi-country Partnership Framework

- The Pacific Multi-Country CPF 2013-2017 covers FAO support interventions in 13 PICs and one territory, Tokelau with an indicative budget of US\$44.2 million. 13 Pacific Island Forum Countries excluding PNG
- Currently covers 80 (national and multi-country) projects
- The overarching goal of the CPF 2013-2017 is improved food security and income earning opportunities.

  Indicative US\$ Resource Distribution to Priority Areas
- 4 areas of strategic focus:
- (1) Evidence-based Policy and
- Strategic Planning;
- (2) Food and Nutrition Security Resilient to Disasters and Climate Change;
- (3) Value/Supply Chain Efficiency and Market Access;
- (4) Environmental Management and Resilience





## In 2015 Agriculture Ministers meeting identified 4 innovative models for future service delivery, and focusing comparative advantage and prioritization

- 1. Technical assistance with regard to agricultural education will not be provided directly but will be delivered through FAO South-South Cooperation arrangements.
- 2. FAO will seek an expanded partnership with SPC for technical assistance to Member Countries relating to the production of well established tropical crops in the cropping patterns of the Pacific.
- 3. FAO will collaborate with SPC programmes in support of the collection of statistics.
- 4. FAO delivery of technical assistance with regard to nutrition will target national policies and the elaboration and implementation of approaches to agricultural development that can influence and improve nutrition outcomes.

#### Two over-arching objectives of next 5 year plan

- 1. To develop an action programme principally targeted at addressing food and nutrition challenges facing PICs.
- 2. To develop a work programme focussed on improved:

<u>coordination</u> to share and apply best practices through regional processes and partnerships;

<u>cooperation</u> with regional organizations and financiers on a strategy for development of the food economies in the Pacific;

<u>collaboration</u> with regional organizations to deliver regional public goods and pooled services; and,

<u>harmonisation</u> of standards, regulations and policies which enable and support the food and agricultural sectors of the Pacific.



#### Focus technical areas for CPF 2018-21

The draft programme is built on four thematic foci:

- <u>consumer demand</u> which favours a balanced diet and positive health outcomes;
- well-functioning <u>domestic markets</u> that can bring affordable food to consumers;
- efficient <u>food production</u> from island, atoll and aquatic resources which takes advantage of innovative technologies and practices developed for, and in, islands and atolls; and
- <u>natural resource management</u> practices which protect and enhance the fragile terrestrial and aquatic resources which are the bases for food production and other economic sectors such as tourism.



#### Key Principles in delivery of future assistance

- There is a gradation of the nature of FAO technical assistance to PICs (correlated with GDP per capita).
- Funds allocated from the TCP must be applied to a technical gap which exists in which FAO has recognized competencies and comparative advantage and which cannot be provided more effectively by other entities
- We want to work on fewer technical areas (4 OR 5)
- Focus on projects which are innovative or are catalytic, given the relatively small size (<500k) of most of our projects</li>
- We want to work more in partnership
- Not averse to co-investing where resources are available but FAO identified another agency with a comparative advantage in that technical area
