

Map of KGA Provincial Partners - December 2013



POTENTIAL ROLES AND OPPORTUNITIES for SI FOs in Agriculture development

- Agriculture farming is Small holder based- many scattered production units
- Land Tenure- over 80% of land is owned and control by tribes
- Pooling of resources (land, capital, labour)
- Economy of scale for various activities
- Solidarity of lobbying for support
- Resilient despite economic or natural down turns

- Benefits localised providing cash flow in rural areas
- Self-employment reducing urban drift
- Caters for Common Good and welfare
- Strengthen social fabric coherence through economic inclusive empowerment thru' participation of resource owners
- Satisfy socio-economic welfare oriented market demands
- Role of FOs agric sector and community will be different

Why FOs could play more active participation in Agriculture Development in SI

- Agricultural sector is small holder farmer based
- Much of agric land is customary tenure – communally owned
- Titles to large number of returned "alienated lands" to tribal landowners were coconut/cocoa/cattle plantations
- Other communally owned land were also registered to tribes for development purposes FO – based production units help consolidation of supply side of commodities
- Registered communal land ideal for development and commercialisation of potential higher value coconut products
- Ideal for complying with niche market (Organic, Fair-trade etc) requirements

- Facilitate investment and strengthen linkages with the higher marketing/trading/value-chain
- May facilitate access to financial credit along the value-chain
- Pooling of resources (land, capital and labour)
- Rise of Savings Clubs
- Economy of scale lead to high chances of viability
- Ensure focused support services to the FOs rather than thinly spread to individual HHs
- Enable FOs to venture into more sustainable businesses and selfreliance
- Immediate benefits to members
- Common Goods and community welfare can be facilitated

PIFON OBJECTIVES (Cont.)

- 5. To raise the profile of FOs in the Pacific and give farmers a voice in regional and international forums influencing and securing farmer driven donor support.

Objectives translated into three (3) broad types of activities:

- 1. Enhancing viability and sustainability of national FOs;
- 2. Providing practical information to member farmers to enable them to better participate in income generating activities; and,
- 3. Providing practical information to member farmers to enable them to adopt more sustainable production practices.
